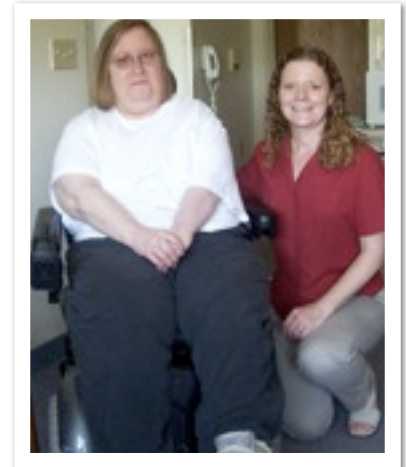
Can you imagine your car dealer doing that?

Though we're committed to ultra-customer satisfaction, doing so puts extra strain on our already tight budget. Without the dedicated support of individual donors these additional services would not be possible. Batteries, controllers, leg rests, seat belts, seat cushions, tires, and chargers all add up. Your \$20 or \$40 donations make a huge difference and are what allows us to continue repairing and servicing wheelchairs to keep people like Tina rolling.

We first assisted Tina in 2004, providing her a power wheelchair so she could safely travel outside of her home worry free. She

recently contacted us about the chair not working so we picked it up and diagnosed the problem. Not only were her batteries in need of replacement but there was also a short in the joystick that runs the chair. We spent \$150 to replace her batteries and were able to "dig-up" a replacement joystick out of our inventory of parts, saving an additional \$500-\$600.

Crystal and her mother Madeline live in a small second story Connecticut apartment. The wheelchair Crystal uses at school was too large for Madeline to carry up the steps and was often left on the cold damp front porch. At night Madeline would carry Crystal to their apartment where she had to sit in a stroller or crawl around on the floor. Not quite something an independent spirited 9-year-old wants to do at night.

After a few minor adjustments we were able to ship a lightweight collapsible wheelchair to Crystal and Madeline. With the new chair Madeline can easily carry it upstairs or place it in the back of her car to take Crystal anywhere they want to go. Best of all, Crystal no longer has to rely on someone pushing her around in the stroller. Crystal's teacher tells us Crystal feels very confident with her newfound independence and is especially happy the chair is even pink, her favorite color!



Holiday Wish List

We are currently in need of the following items:

- Upright vacuum cleaner with on board tools for cleaning wheelchairs and the office floors.
- Snow shovels and gently used snow blower for clearing sidewalks around the office.
- Standard and Metric tools for repairing wheelchairs. (Ratchet sets, allen wrenches, pliers, screwdrivers, etc.)
- Portable air compressor with tire inflation chuck and blow gun attachment.
- Plastic tubs to store wheelchair parts. (Small, medium, large, and extra large sizes needed.)
- LCD Projector or television with VCR/DVD input jacks for board room presentations and promotional activities.

Help Us Go Green

We’re doing our part to help out the environment too. We recently evaluated our inventory of older and now obsolete equipment and recycled what would have been too costly to repair or reuse. Any usable parts were salvaged for future use on other chairs and all metal was recycled. We also recycled 46 wheelchair batteries and received \$160 cash for doing so. This money is going back to our program to build storage racks for manual wheelchairs and used wheelchair parts.

Donate your used 12-volt lead acid car or marine batteries to Alternatives in Motion and we will recycle them and donate the cash back to our program. Clean out your garage, help the environment, and contribute a little bit to Alternatives in Motion at the same time. Temporary Solutions

Carolyn is one of many recent recipients who have called upon Alternatives in Motion to assist with their temporary mobility needs.

Carolyn was referred to us by Mary Free Bed Rehabilitation Hospital where she was undergoing rehab for injuries suffered from falling down a flight of stairs. She had multiple broken bones and was told by doctors she needed to be off her feet for three months. Her insurance didn't cover the \$136 wheelchair rental fee so we stepped in to help. We had a chair in our inventory that was exactly what was prescribed for her at the hospital. Instead of being totally bedridden and homebound Carolyn was able to use the chair to visit with friends and travel around the city during her recovery.

We are happy to report that as of November 25, Carolyn no longer needs the wheelchair and gave it back to Alternatives in Motion to be used for someone else. Carolyn is thankful for the chair because she is not a stay at home person. She said she is looking forward to recovering further so she can go ice skating and tubing with friends and family next winter.



Swinging for Mobility

Participants in the 4th Annual "What's Your Handicap?" Golf Classic had an opportunity to see first hand how their participation helped provide the gift of mobility.

This year all proceeds from our silent auction and raffle ticket sales were designated towards the purchase of a new manual wheelchair for Joan Wegner. Joan was one of our first recipients and had recently applied for a new chair through her insurance company but was only granted partial coverage. The chair she had been using was 6-years-old and in need of replacement. Joan contacted Alternatives in Motion to see if we could help raise the nearly \$1,800 needed for her new chair.

While in college Joan was a victim of a robbery gone bad. She was stabbed 27 times and paralyzed from the waist down due to severe blood loss. After spending months in the hospital, Joan learned she could still live independently in a wheelchair. Because of her friendship with Johnnie Tuitel she received her first wheelchair from Alternatives in Motion in 1995.



On Monday Aug. 11, 2008 she joined us at the golf outing and gave a moving and inspiring speech that brought the audience to their feet. She shared her story with our golfers and was thankful for all that Alternatives in Motion has done for her and her family. A special thank you goes out to all of our golfers who participated in this event and made Joan's wish for a new wheelchair come true.
